At all four of Wm Massies plantations in the year 1852, including cooks (but excluding hirelings & help from mechanics, house servants &c) 59 hands of all sorts & sizes were worked, and by dividing said 59 hands into the above sum of \$5703.97 1/2 there appears an average income of \$96.68 to each hand. Though this was an extra year, as near three fourths of the crop of flour made in 1851 was sold this year, besides 25 hhd's of Tobacco which is not usual. The past has been a great year & great has been the disbursements--

In the above estimate, the smiths & smiths work, the carpenters, coopers & waggonmakers [sic], with all the flour barrels, Tobacco hhd's, waggons [sic] carts, plows &c made by the latter, my two teams with all the produce they hawled [sic] to market & my three mills, with all their tolls & conveniences have been left out, in the estimate of the crop force, or plantation force, and had the plantations been taxed with those charges together with my services & that of Mrs Massie as much, or more would have been taken off than has been charged to said plantations for the support of my family, & education of my children.
